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
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level of clarity and focus in institutional functioning towards quality enhancement and provide sound basis for decision-making to improve institutional functioning.

As thewre were no additional points meeting was adjourned with vote of thanks proposed by Dr. V. G. Bhamre.


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

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
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Agenda item 2: Review of teaching learning activities

A brief review was taken on the teaching learning activities and the syllabus completion status. Dr. A. P. Bedse discussed the initiatives taken for the implementation of outcome based education system wherein the focus was on the overall development of students. Taking Covid 19 pandemic and shifting of online education to offline education into consideration, college has adopted the method of blended education. She briefed the meeting about expert sessions taken during the period Jan - Jun 2021. Dr. Bedse has presented the statistics of SWAYAM/NPTEL enrollments, GPAT, CMAT and NIPER examination qualification. All members applauded the initiatives taken by college for the earlier said examinations. Dr. V. S. Mane suggested crucial analysis of mentor mentee meeting through which we can identify the opportunities and challenges in the coaching of candidate.

D. K. Kadam tabled the result analysis of internal examinations, continuous assessment and the schedule of semester examinations for all years.

Agenda item 3: Preparation of annual institution plan 2022-23

Dr. A. P. Bedse and S. S. Raut presented the tentative annual institution plan prepared for the academic year 2022-23. Dr. Bedse highlight that as the institute is affiliated to Dr. B. A. Tech. University Lonere the prepared institutional plan is subject to variation in accordance with the academic calendar prepared by the university. Dr. V. S. Mane has suggested to start working on accreditation process and that is to be time framed as well.

Agenda item 4: Focus on co-curricular and extracurricular activities for holistic development of students.

Dr. V. G. Bhamre informed the members about add on course entitled "Research Perspectives in Pharmacy" wherein faculty members contributed in design of the syllabus, course outcomes and mode of examination. Total 56 students has benefitted from the said add on course. Dr. V. S. Mane asked about the procedure adopted for the design of course curriculum and mode of examination. In response Dr. V. G. Bhamre mentioned the steps followed which include discussion on the possible topics or syllabus of add on course in HOD coordinator meeting followed by briefing to faculty

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about those discussions in Staff meeting. Three topic were identified namely Hands on training for the analytical instruments, Research Perspectives in Pharmacy and Pharmacovigilance/Medical Coding. The majority of faculty has shown their interest in the topic "Research Perspectives in Pharmacy". The topic finalized in the meeting and Dr. V. G. Bhamre has shouldered the responsibility for the planning and executions of 30 hours add on course.

K. P. Baviskar has briefed about the expert sessions, training session and industrial visit arranged in passing semester. She has also discussed about the future plan for overall development of students. Mr. Mayur Bidgar has suggested arranging offline mock interviews for the final year students so that they can be prepared about the dos and don'ts in interview. Dr. R. D. Amrutkar asked T & P team to plan the activity in coming period.

Agenda Item 5: Discussion on perspective plan

Dr. R. D. Amrutkar presented the perspective plan 2022-27 for the development of institute. The plan mainly focuses on Curricular Aspects, Teaching Learning and Evaluation, Research Consultancy and Extension, Infrastructure and Learning resources, Student Support and Progression, Governance Leadership and Management, Environment consciousness. He proposes to continue with the best practices adopted by the college.

Dr. V. S. Mane has suggested working on the innovation aspect. For the same establishment of Institute Innovation Cell could be much beneficial, he added. All members assured to work on the same and get it done at earliest.

A brief review was taken on implementation of e-governance in various operations of institute. Dr. R. D. 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B- The institution reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities.

Preamble

The institute has a review mechanism for teaching-learning process which involves HODs, Academic committee, Exam Committee and all senior faculty members. Principal, as well as the Academic committee takes review of the teaching-learning process, through regular meetings and reviews with staff and HOD's for the proper implementation of academic curriculum set at the commencement of academic year. Teaching and Attendance records are maintained by each faculty.

The implementation of teaching-learning is done by

- 1. Academic (Program) committee prepares the Academic Calendar based on that by the University and executes it meticulously. The committee and the Heads of Departments conduct meetings and based on the experience, expertise of the faculty, syllabus distribution is done, workload is calculated adhering to the prescribed number of hours as per the course structure and timetables are prepared and approved by the Principal.
- 2. The program committee monitors the effective implementation of the Academic Calendar regularly. The time tables are communicated to the faculty members and students by displaying on the Notice Board and the college website.
- 3. Each faculty prepares a teaching plan as per guidelines received from the university before commencement of each semester. The course files are prepared and updated by respective faculty.
- 4. The faculty uses ICT tools, chalk and board, charts, maps, models specimens and conducts seminars, group discussion, quiz, case studies, projects, expert lectures/sessions field and industrial visits and study material in form of library, e-library and e-content for effective delivery of curriculum.
- 5. The college encourages the faculty to participate in faculty development workshops to be updated.



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Ensurance through documents

Program committee periodically reviews the syllabus completion status of each subject. The faculty engages extra lectures and practicals if necessary. The students maintain the practical journals and the results are certified by the faculty.

Students are assessed for their performances through internal and University exams and Continuous Assessment involving unit test, question answer sessions, attendance, journals, vivavoce, quiz etc. The academic quality and progress of students is reviewed with the help of class coordinators and includes student attendance records, syllabus completion status, students' performance and feedback and corrective measures are discussed with the faculty.

The college periodically collects the feedbacks from the faculty, students, alumni and parents regarding the effective curriculum delivery and dissemination and corrective actions are taken.

Formative assessment is done to identify gaps in students' knowledge which helps to identify slow and advanced learners. While, slow learners are provided with Remedial Coaching, the advanced learners are encouraged for further progression in career by participating in co-curricular activities and career oriented programs as well as competitive exams.

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g. Mentoring System

MENTORING POLICY

K. K. WAGH COLLEGE OF PHARMACY HIRABAI HARIDAS VIDYANAGARI PANCHAVATI NASHIK 422003



Preamble:

The experience of the college life is commonly identified as a move away from family and home. For many students, it may be the first instance to stay away from family restrictions and living independent life. It is a transitional period in terms of economic status wherein, students are financially dependent on the family, but they learn to manage their expenses by staying away from home. These factors contribute to tremendous changes in the behavioral aspects of the students. Also during this period, they are introduced to a wide range of technical /professional courses under the programs offered to them. At times, this adds to the stress and anxiety amongst the students. If all these issues of students' life are apprised effectively and mentored properly, raw teenagers may be chiseled out as sound professionals commensurate to the demand of the society.

Objectives:

- To provide a platform to the students for sharing their problems related to academic and non-academic matters.
- To monitor the academic progress of the students.
- To identify the slow learners, fast learners and the weak learner students and to provide suitable environment to them to grow and prosper in equal manner.
- To provide an invention and assistance to the students to grab the opportunity for their growth and development.
- To cultivate higher degree of professional responsibilities and imbibe the values amongst the young students.
- To provide an opportunity for overall development to all the students.

Procedure for Mentoring:

Step-I: Orientation of the Mentors

Prior to the commencement of the academic semester, the faculty members are to be oriented and sensitized regarding the importance and objectives of the mentoring process. They need to be made to realize that mentoring of the students at the college is part of their professional duty. During the orientation session, the faculty members need to be oriented with the do's and don'ts of the mentoring process. The HODs/Senior faculty members of the institute/ department may coordinate and act as resource persons for this orientation session.

Step-II: Allocation of students to the Mentors

The concerned HoD/Section Head will assign a group of 20-25 students to an individual faculty member. Preferably, the same faculty member should remain as the mentor for the same group during the group's entire tenure at the College.

Step-III: Filing the Mentoring Form and Preliminary Round of Mentoring

After group allocation, the mentor shall plan of for a preliminary round of mentoring. This round should be organized in the first week of the semester. All the students shall be informed about the mentoring session through e-mail and notice (day/date/time/venue/ etc.). The mentor will get the forms filled up by the students under him/her mentorship and will maintain proper record of the same. During the orientation session, the mentor will make them comfortable and try to develop a good rapport with them, so that the students can easily approach the mentor in future.

After primary briefing and form filling, the mentor shall interact with each individual student and will make necessary remarks in form. While, filling this form, the academic progress, behavioral aspects, attendance related issues and participation in all-round development activities should be taken into consideration. Based on all such details, the mentor will identify the academic category of the students, i.e., slow learner, advanced learner or weak in studies. Depending upon the academic category of the students, he/she should be guided to grow and develop. Especially, for the advanced /fast learners, the necessary environment, encouragement should be provided to excel.

Step-IV: Next Round of Mentoring

The next round of mentoring should be arranged monthly and after the each Sessional and Semester exam (preferably after declaration of results). The main purpose of this mentoring session is to monitor the academic performance of the students, to review the attendance, to review the progress etc. The mentor will also observe the improvements in the students after the first round of mentoring.

Thus, in a semester, minimum three mentoring sessions should be arranged. However, for the special cases, where continuous monitoring and follow-ups are required, series of mentoring sessions can be arranged.

The mentors will maintain a separate file for all the students assigned to him/her. He/she will keep all the update details of the students under him/her, provide them monitoring time to time and report the outcome to HOD/Section Head, regularly.

Step-V: Analysis

All the mentoring reports (only summary) are submitted to the concerned HoD/Section Head. The HoD/ Section Head will take necessary actions, wherever required and may inform the concerned Principal/ Management.

For all the cases where improvement is not seen/ difficult to mentor, should be immediately reported to the concerned authority.

The above policy is of general nature and it can be modified according to needs and requirements of concerned authority.



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Day 3 (31 December 2021)



Day 4 (1 January 2022)


Mrs Prajakta Shingote was highlighted communication skills and its importance. She also talked about the various communication skills that are required for effective communication in the job and in private life.




